## **I/TENSES:**

<u>12 TENSES</u>: Simple Present, Present Continuous, Present Perfect, Present Perfect Continuous, Simple Past, Past Continuous, Past Perfect, Past Perfect Continuous, Simple Future, Future Continuous, Future Perfect, Future Perfect Continuous.

#### **II/ CONDITIONALS:**

## a) Zero Conditional:

#### **Facts / General definitions:**

If water reaches 100 degrees Celsius, it boils.

#### b) First Conditional:

#### Future situations believed to be real or possible:

If it rains tomorrow, we will cancel the picnic.

#### To give conditional instructions:

If you see Sarah, tell her to call me immediately.

Formal form: Should you need any assistance, please tell me.

#### c) Second Conditional:

## Hypothetical situations in the present or future:

If I won the lottery, I would travel around the world.

If I were you, I would not say stupid things in that situation.

Formal form: Were she to apply for the position, she would likely get the job.

#### d) Third Conditional:

#### **Hypothetical situations in the past:**

If she had studied harder, she would have passed the exam.

<u>Formal form</u>: Had she applied for the scholarship, she would have received funding for her studies.

#### e) Mixed Conditional:

If he had studied harder last month, he would not be sad now. (Type 3 + Type 2)

If I were you, I would have taken the job offer last month. (Type 2 + Type 3)

## f) Other Structures:

#### **Unless:**

Unless you pay your bill by the due date, your service will be disconnected.

#### Otherwise:

Finish the project today; otherwise, we'll miss the deadline.

## As long as / So long as:

As long as you study hard, you will pass the exam.

## **Provided (that) / Providing (that):**

Provided you finish your work on time, you can leave early.

#### On condition that:

The package will be delivered on time on condition that the address is correct.

### **Suppose / Supposing:**

Suppose you were to win the lottery, what would you do with the money?

#### If it weren't for / Were it not for:

If it weren't for your help, I wouldn't have been able to finish the project on time.

Were it not for the rain, we could have had a picnic in the park.

#### **But for / Without:**

But for your timely intervention, we would have lost the contract.

Without your assistance, I wouldn't have been able to complete the project on time.

#### If it hadn't been for / Had it not been for:

If it hadn't been for his advice, I wouldn't have pursued that opportunity.

Had it not been for the traffic jam, I would have arrived early.

#### If ... (should) happen to:

If you should happen to encounter any issues, please let us know immediately.

#### If ... should:

If you should need further assistance, feel free to contact us.

#### If ... happened to:

If I happened to win the lottery, I would donate a portion to charity.

#### If ... were to:

If prices were to increase, we might reconsider our budget.

#### If so / If not:

Are you interested in video games? If so, join us.

#### In case of:

In case of emergency, dial 911.

#### In case:

Take an umbrella with you in case it rains later.

#### I would prefer it if:

I would prefer it if you didn't smoke in front of the children.

## **III/ INVERSIONS:**

## 1) Type 1 (without auxiliary verb):

"There goes Tom!" // "There he goes!"

"Up went the ballon!" // "Up it went!"

"I've just finished.", said Tom // "I've just finished.", he said.

## a) Inversions With 'No':

## In no way:

In no way should you compromise your values.

#### At no time:

At no time was the suspect seen near the crime scene.

#### On no account:

On no account are employees permitted to share confidential information.

#### **Under no circumstances:**

Under no circumstances should you open this door during the experiment.

#### For no reason:

For no reason did he abandon his lifelong dream.

#### **Nowhere:**

Nowhere could we find a more perfect spot for our picnic.

#### No longer:

No longer does she worry about trivial matters.

#### No + noun:

No sneakers shall I buy for you.

## b) Inversions With 'Only':

## Only by:

Only by working together can we overcome this challenge.

#### Only when:

Only when the sun sets does the night sky reveal its true beauty.

#### Only after:

Only after thorough testing should the product be released to the market.

## Only if:

Only if all safety protocols are followed will employees be allowed to operate the machinery.

#### Only in this way:

Only in this way can we ensure the preservation of these endangered species.

#### Only then:

Only then did she realize the true value of her education.

## Only with:

Only with proper preparation can students excel in their exams.

#### c) Inversions With 'Not':

#### Not until:

Not until the last minute did he submit his assignment.

#### Not since:

Not since the 1980s has this style of music been so popular.

#### Not even once:

Not even once has she missed a day of work in her entire career.

#### Not only ... but also:

Not only did she win the competition, but she also set a new record.

#### Not any:

Not any chances will we work together in the future.

## d) Inversions With 'So'/'Such':

#### So:

So exhausted was she after the marathon that she slept for twelve hours straight.

So quickly did the news spread that within an hour, the whole town knew about the incident.

#### Such:

Such was his dedication to the project that he worked through weekends and holidays.

## f) Other structures:

#### **Never:**

Never have I tasted such delicious sushi.

## Rarely:

Rarely does one encounter such kindness from strangers.

#### Hardly:

Hardly can she contain her excitement about the upcoming concert.

#### Seldom:

Seldom do we see such perfect weather conditions for stargazing.

## Little:

Little did they realize the impact their discovery would have on modern science.

#### **Never before:**

Never before has the city experienced such extreme temperatures.

#### No sooner ... than:

No sooner had we arrived at the beach than it started to rain.

#### Hardly ... when:

Hardly had I fallen asleep when the phone rang.

#### Scarcely ... when:

Scarcely had the plane taken off when the passengers heard a strange noise.

#### **Neither:**

He hadn't done any homework, neither had he brought any of his books to class.

#### Nor:

We didn't get to see the castle, nor did we see the cathedral.

#### So:

"I like chicken." – "So do I."

#### Though // As:

Tired though she was, she continued working on her project.

#### As:

Italy produces many excellent wines, as does Spain.

France is a founder member of the EU, as is Belgium.

#### Than:

Children living in villages watch more television than do their counterparts in inner city areas.

The infants of humans are more helpless than are those of most other animals.

#### **However:**

However beautiful she is, she is not a good student.

However beautifully she sings, she is not a good student.

#### **IV/ RELATIVES:**

a) Relatives: who, whom, whose, which, that, where, when, why, that.

## b) Advanced Points:

## + "which" as a determiner:

Example 1: She may be late, in which case we ought to wait for her.

Example 2: He lost his temper, at which point I decided to go home.

Example 3: He was appointed Lord Chancellor, in which post he spent the rest of his life.

#### + Position of prepositions:

Example 1: He was respected by the people with whom he worked.

Example 2: This is the room in which I was born.

#### + "some of whom", "none of which", etc.:

Example 1: She adopted seven stray cats, all of which needed medical attention.

<u>Example 2</u>: The team recruited ten volunteers, <u>five of whom</u> had prior experience in disaster relief.

## + "whatever", "whoever":

Example 1: Take whatever you want.

Example 2: This is for whoever wants it.

## + Reduced relative clauses:

Example 1: Who's the girl dancing with your brother?

Example 2: Please send me all the tickets available.

## **V/ MODAL VERBS:**

a) Modal Verbs: can, could, may, might, shall, should, will, would, must, ought to, need, had better, have to, dare to, used to.

#### b) Advanced Points:

#### + Degree of certainty:

Complete certainty: shall, will, must, can't

Probability: should, ought to

Possibility: may, might, could

#### + Obligation and freedom to act:

Strong obligation: must, will, need

Prohibition: must not, may not, cannot

Weak obligation/Recommendation: should, ought to, might, shall

<u>Willingness/Volunteering/Resolving/Insisting/Offering</u>: will, shall (in questions)

Permission: can, could, may, might

Absence of obligation: needn't

Ability: can, could

+ Perfect infinitive (Past):

Example 1: You should have told me you were coming.

Example 2: I think I may have annoyed Aunt Mary.\

- names of objects considered unique.
   the earth, the Eiffel Tower, the equator
- cinemas of:
  cinemas and theatres: the Rex; ships: the Titanic;
  hotels: the Hilton; institutions: the RSPCA; documents:
  the constitution; public bodies: the government;
  newspapers: The Times; historical events: the Second
  World War; museums: the British Museum; some jobs:
  the dentist, group nouns: the public; collective plural
  nouns: the police, the audience

#### Note

Restaurants, cafés, shops, banks or hotels which have the name of their founder and end in s or 's do not take the.

- names of: seas: the Black Sea; rivers: the Nile; groups of islands: the Dodecanese; mountain ranges: the Alps; groups of states: the USA; gulfs: the Persian Gulf; oceans: the Pacific; canals: the Panama Canal
- names of people/families in the plural and nationality/ethnic nouns.

## 1) Wishes:

#### Regret about a present situation:

I wish (If only) he were here now.

#### Regret about a past situation:

I wish (If only) he had been with be yesterday.

### Complain/Request/A wish for a change:

I wish (If only) he would stop lying. (complaint)

I wish (If only) you would help me. (request)

I wish (If only) it would stop raining. (a wish for a change)

NEVER SAY: I wish I would...

## Regret about a present situation due to lack of ability:

I wish (If only) he could speak French.

## 2) Unreal Past:

# a) Past simple:

Conditional type 2: If I were you, I would resign.

Wishes (present): I wish I were in London.

I would rather/sooner (present): I would sooner you answered me now.

Suppose/Supposing: Suppose you were fired, what would you do?

As if/though: He behaves as if he were rich.

<u>It's (about/high) time</u>: It's time we left.

#### b) Past perfect:

Conditional type 3: If I had been told earlier, I wouldn't have acted this way.

Wishes (past): If only you hadn't ruined my dress!

I would rather/sooner (past): I would rather he hadn't behaved like that last night.

<u>Suppose/Supposing</u>: Suppose you had lost all your money, what would you have done?

As if/though: He looked as if he had won the prize.

## **VIII/ CAUSATIVE FORMS:**

## a) Instruct someone to do something for us:

I'll ask the mechanic to repair my car.

=> I'll have my car repaired.

### b) Describe an accident or misfortune:

His car was stolen.

=> He had/got his car stolen.

## c) Finish doing something:

I must get my homework done over the weekend.

## d) Make or persuade somebody to do something:

The coach got the players to train hard for five hours everyday.

See if you can get Paul and Mary to join us at the concert.

## e) Make somebody/something start doing something:

Once you get/have her talking about her travels, she never stops.

## f) Give instructions or orders:

The teacher had the students do the exercises in class.

## g) Indicate that you would like or need something to be done:

I want the room cleaned.

I need the report checked.

#### What with

I'm very tired, what with travelling all day yesterday and having a disturbed night.

#### In lieu of/Instead of

He gave a written statement in lieu of appearing in court.

#### In terms of

In terms of cost, this option is better.

#### For fear of

She avoided speaking for fear of causing an argument.

## On top of

On top of his regular duties, he had to train the new hires.

#### In view of

In view of recent events, the trip was canceled.

#### On the basis of

The decision was made on the basis of new evidence.

#### Much as

Much as I would like to help you, I'm simply too busy at the moment.

#### Contrary to

Contrary to popular belief, bats are not blind.

## In light of

In light of recent developments, we must change our strategy.

#### In accordance with

The policy was updated in accordance with the new law.

#### With a view to

He studied hard with a view to passing the exam.

#### XI/ OTHER IMPORTANT STRUCTURES:

## Dangling Modifier (hành động của vế bổ nghĩa thuộc về subject chính):

Example 1: Having finished the assignment, Jill turned on the TV.

Example 2: Having arrived late for practice, the team captain needed a written excuse.

#### **Cleft Sentence:**

Example 1: It was my husband who/that you spoke to on the phone.

Example 2: What they like is smoked salmon.

#### **Absolute Structure:**

Example 1: The storm having passed, we left the shelter.

Example 2: Her work finished, Sarah went to bed.

Example 3: His face pale, he delivered the bad news.

#### **Tag Questions (special cases):**

<u>Example 1</u>: She <u>never</u> calls you, <u>does she</u>? (nếu vế chính có các từ như *never*, *hardly*, *seldom*, *rarely*, *barely*, *scarcely*, *nobody*, *nothing*, vế tag question chia **positive**)

Example 2: I'm right, aren't I?

Example 3: Let's go home, shall we?

Example 4: Everybody left early, didn't they?

Example 5: She ought to apologize, shouldn't she?

Example 6: I think she's lying, isn't she? // I don't believe they have left, have they?

# Order of Adjectives (OSASCOMP => Opinion – Size – Age – Shape – Color – Origin – Material – Purpose):

Example: She bought a beautiful small old round red Italian wooden cooking pot.

# "used to do something" và "be used to doing sth":

"used to do something" nghĩa là đã từng làm 1 việc gì đó trong quá khứ (She <u>used to cook</u> dinner for her family => Cô ấy <u>đã từng nấu</u> bữa tối cho gia đình cô ta).

"be used to doing something" nghĩa là quen với việc làm gì đó (She <u>is used to cooking</u> dinner for her family => Cô ấy <u>quen với việc nấu</u> bữa tối cho gia đình cô ta).

# "be always doing sth" dùng để than phiền:

Example: She is always criticizing his son.

## "by the time" có 2 cách dùng phổ biến:

<u>Cách 1</u>: By the time I <u>arrived</u>, they <u>had finished</u> their dinner. (Past Perfect)

<u>Cách 2</u>: By the time I <u>arrive</u>, they <u>will have finished</u> their dinner. (Future Perfect)

## "how" + adjective/adverb + subject + verb:

Example 1: I was impressed by how beautiful the sunset is.

Example 2: I was impressed by how quickly she ran.

#### "Why not...?":

Example: Why not use my car? You'll fit more in.

### "no matter" + Wh-word:

Example 1: I never seem to lose any weight, no matter how hard I try.

Example 2: We've got to get to the airport on time, no matter what.

#### the more – the more:

Example 1: The harder you study, the better the result is.

Example 2: The more generous you are, the more loved you are.

#### "be believed to...":

<u>Present + Present</u>: He <u>is believed to speak</u> five languages fluently.

<u>Present + Past</u>: The scientist <u>is believed to have discovered</u> a new species last year.

Past + Past: The ancient city was believed to have been destroyed by a tsunami.

## more A than B (cảm xúc A lấn át cảm xúc B):

Example: She was more confused than angry.

## "may/might as well" (tốt nhất là nên làm 1 cái gì đó):

Example: We might as well walk there.

### "have yet to":

Example: They have yet to make a decision. (They haven't made a decision yet.)

#### "Many a...":

Example: Many a student has struggled with this difficult exam. (Many students have struggled with this difficult exam.)

## "Though" + adjective:

Example: Though beautiful, she is not a good student.

# "That..." = "The fact that...":

Example: The fact that he lied surprises me. // That he lied surprises me.

## "along with" / "together with" (bo qua):

<u>Example</u>: <u>This condition</u>, <u>together/along with</u> the high blood pressure, <u>puts</u> her in a high-risk group. (chia động từ theo "This condition", bỏ qua cả vế "together/along with...")

## "There" (special case):

<u>Example</u>: There <u>IS a table</u>, two chairs, and three calculators. / There <u>ARE</u> two chairs, a table, and three calculators. (Khi liệt kê danh sách với "There", việc chia số ít hay số nhiều phụ thuộc vào item đầu tiên)

#### "Neither...nor" // "Either...or"

Example 1: Neither the manager nor the employees were aware of the policy change.

Example 2: Either the director or the producer decides the final cut of the film.

=> Khi thấy 2 cấu trúc này, ta chia động từ theo danh từ thứ 2, không quan tâm danh từ thứ 1. Ở ví dụ thứ nhất, "the employees" là số nhiều nên chia "were"; ở ví dụ thứ hai, "the producer" là số ít nên chia "decides".

#### "the first/only/last one to...":

Example: He is the first person to leave the party.

"the" + adj = adj + "people"

Example: the rich = rich people; the poor = poor people; the blind = blind people
